#### Maundy Thursday - Passover Celebration on April 21st.

Passover is the feast of freedom. Once again this year we will celebrate Passover at St. Peter's. It is worship, it is a party, and it is a feast. It is also a special time of learning, aimed especially at children, and at adults teaching their children the faith. We will begin at 6 p.m. with a remembrance of the plagues in Egypt, the passing over of the angel of death, and the flight to freedom. Then we will have a feast (in this case a potluck supper - no pork, bacon, etc, please). Following the feast we will have a closing celebration. During the feast everyone

gets 4 cups of wine, or grape juice, or some of each. Your choice, for yourself and your children. There is no need to drain each cup. But we invite you and your family to celebrate and to learn the background of our Christian celebration of communion.




#### OUTREACH:

#### 150 years ago March 1861----Missions

"The Canada Conference of the Pittsburg Synod proved to be a missionary body. During the years 1853-1861, some eighteen congregations were organized, two or three each year. Canada Conference missionaries visited Hay Township as early as 1854." In Zurich, services were conducted by L.H. Gerndt and J.A. Hengerer. J.N. Muenzinger "was licensed by the Pittsburg Synod, 1860, and assigned to the Huron Mission (Zurich)". A sister congregation was organized near Dashwood. By December 1861, Rev. Muenzinger had officiated at 142 baptisms – some from Bayfield, Stanley Township and Stephen Township. That same year he traveled and served communion to believers at Bayfield (11) at Egmondville (30) and in Hullett Township (14). This missionary work was continued by pastors who followed him with the result new congregations were organized at these places. Missionary visits continued into the 1880's.

#### 150 years ago April 1861---Twos

The number two describes our congregation quite well.

- <u>Two</u> denominations The Evangelical Lutheran and Reformed united as one congregation on January 1, 1861.
- One pastor conducted services until 1872 for <u>two</u> congregations St. Peter's, Zurich and St. John's, Bronson Line.
- <u>Two</u> languages were used for services and for records. By 1864 all marriages were written in English.
- <u>Two</u> churches were built on <u>two</u> different sites. In 1860, the first wooden church was built on Frederick Street near Main Street. In 1878 a brick building was constructed on Goshen Street.
- The first parsonage in 1860 was built on the same site as the present parsonage.
- The first pastor, Rev. Muenzinger, (1860 -1864) returned to our congregation for a <u>second</u> period of service from 1877 -1883).
- The first cemetery (near the public school) was used for burials from 1860 -1886. The <u>second</u> and present cemetery was opened in 1887.
- In 1878 a bell was placed in the bell tower. In 1884 85 Mr. Heinrich Klippert presented our congregation with the second bell.
- The first altar (presently situated in the Fellowship Hall) was replaced by our <u>present</u> altar donated by the Luther League in 1926 when the basement was finished.
- To enter the present sanctuary from the narthex, there were <u>two</u> doors one for the men and the other for the women. In 1986 the new entrance was constructed.
- In 1908 a ladies' group (Ladies Aid) was formed under Rev. Maass. In 1932 a <u>second group</u>, the WMS (Women's Missionary Society) was formed by Rev. Turkheim. <u>Two</u> groups functioned until they amalgamated in 1965. As of 2010 there is no official ladies' group.

#### Member Biography: Phylis Deichert



Phylis Deichert was born at her parent's home on Lot 4, Concession 11 in Stanley township. She was the only girl with 4 brothers. Her hobby was and continues to be music.

As a child, Phylis, first attended Blake United and later the Goshen church. Phylis's father was the Sunday School Superintendent and she remembers having a specified seat in church and when the adults went up for communion, the children stayed

quietly behind in the their seats. When she was a little older, Phylis played piano for the Sunday School and sometimes for church. For 3 years Phylis enjoyed going to the Christian summer camp, Camp Menesetung, and still remembers the fun of attending Youth Day Rallies at the Goshen church. When I asked if she had any regrets from her youth, Phylis said, "only that I never learned to skate".

Phylis attended Zurich Public School up to Grade 10. In order to finish grade 13, she had to board in Clinton from Monday to Friday. She received her diploma in 1946. Phylis's mother and grandmother were both teachers and she followed in their footsteps, as she was expected to. Though, unlike her mother and grandmother, Phylis continued to teach after her marriage, because after the war, "they were crying for teachers". I asked if Phylis had ever encountered any language barriers because of emigration but the only language problem she could remember was one child, who did speak English and had started school in Holland, did have difficulty with the written part of the English lessons.

Phylis met her husband Earl at a dance in Hensall (even though her grandparents and his were neighbours). She credits their mutual love of music for bringing them together. They married and had three children, though sadly there are only 2 surviving.

The first time Phylis came to St. Peter's was for a Fowl Supper. Everyone met in the basement of St. Peter's and the dinner was served in the shed (which stood where our current Fellowship Hall is). Phylis was never in the church proper until Reverend Turkheim's funeral. Phylis became a member of St. Peter's after Reverend Heimrich had made some home visits to her and Earl. Phylis has been (and continues to be) a valued member of our church who has served on council, in Sunday School, as church historian and as a member of the ELW. Phylis's favourite part of the ELW events was getting to visit other churches, to see their buildings and how other congregations do things whether differently or the same.

In 1975, Phylis had 2 children who were attending UWO and doing well, and she decided if they could excel, so could she. So off she went to University and in 1979 Phylis received her Bachelor of Arts degree in History...though she had started in another course that had only served to pique her interest in history.

After Phylis retired from teaching in 1985, she became interested in St. Peter's history when Pastor Stephen Alles found some baptismal records from 1860. Phylis had these copied at the public school for 10 cents a page and began compiling our church history through these and through birth, confirmation, marriage, death certificates and other sources. In 1996 she wrote a church history book for our 135th anniversary.

These days Phylis is enjoying her retirement by touring area rest homes with her friends and playing country music for the residents.

#### February 4th and 5<sup>th</sup> the youth went to a sleepover at St. Matthews

Lutheran in Kitchener. There were 61 Lutheran and Anglican youth in attendance from Owen Sound to Windsor. We played "Get To Know You" games, had a Bible Study about the Salt and Light portion of the Sermon on the Mount (which seemed to really stick with the kids, as we heard about salt and light from them several times over the next 36 hours). We also played volley

ball, drama games about community, sang praise songs, made new friends with the youth of St. Matthews and led the Saturday night service. When our hosts explained the rules of St. Matthews (i.e. the possibility of a lock down if any outside doors were found open) and that the reason for these rules was to keep everyone safe, the youth learned how difficult life can be for some people. Our Out Service Project at this event was helping to spring clean the nursery at St. Matthews. The youth washed toys, furniture, walls and windows, vacuumed and packed up old toys for donation to another organization and unpacked new toys that were donated to St. Matthews. When we were storm stayed for an extra night, the youth were very helpful and enthusiastic in shoveling us out of the parking lot.

The youth and confirmation class hope that everyone enjoyed the Valentines that St. Peter's Sunday School handed out during the service February 13<sup>th</sup>.
